Fourth Grade Bible Study: Creation

Instructions for Teachers:

Here you will find a collection of references for doing a Bible Study with your students. The mission is for you to lead your students through reading, pondering, and discussing these events recorded in this section of the Bible. All of the studies, from 4th through 7th grade focus on God's covenant relationship with man through particular mediators, Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and Jesus. You will find a brief explanation of the story/events, all the Biblical references to read, and a list of references and resources you can use to prepare yourself.

In the Resources section you will find a few books for your reference. These are chosen because they cover, in a very thorough yet concise way, each of these studies. You will find direct references to the relevant chapters in each of these books. You do not need to use every book. It is advisable to pick one and stick with it. The simplest one is Bible Basics for Catholics, by John Bergsma. This book includes simple stick-figure illustrations that the children could draw to help them learn the details of the studies. Bergsma intentionally included these for teachers and catechists. The most detailed one is Understanding the Scriptures by Scott Hahn, including lots of maps, charts, and artwork depicting scenes from these Bible stories.

Since most of these studies involve multiple sections of Scripture, it would be best to spread these out over the course of weeks or months. The study intentionally correlates with the **Benchmarks** covering the sacrament for your grade so that you can integrate them together. This means the Bible study can be done at any point during the year and used as a reference point for other teachings included in the framework.

You will also find in your Sophia Institute textbook examples of artwork that could correlate with your study.

Overview of the Story

This initial Bible study covers just the first two chapters of the Book of Genesis.

They recount the story of Creation, which includes the cosmos, earth and all that it contained. It continues with the creation of man, who was created in the "image and likeness" of God.

Then woman, as a partner for man and ends with the day of 'rest' where Man and Woman enter into a relationship (covenant) with God. Through the cooperation of this relationship, Man and Woman are given dominion over all of creation to care for the earth and all its inhabitants.

Methodology

Typology: “the study of persons, places, events, and institutions in the Bible that foreshadow later and greater realities made known by God in history.” - Scott Hahn, Catholic Bible Dictionary, pg. 929. See also CCC 128 and pg. 38 of Understanding the Scriptures.

- Man (Adam) was created in the “image and likeness” of God.
 - “Image and likeness” means to be a son, a child of God.
 - Son/child of God points to Jesus, the Son of God.
 - Adam (priest-prophet-king) points to Jesus true (priest-prophet-king)
- Creation points to the sacrament of baptism.
 - “You have become a new creation, and have clothed yourself in Christ” (Rite of Baptism)
- Adam being given “dominion” over the creatures of the earth is a kingly role, which points to Jesus, the true king over heaven and earth.
- God giving Adam the right to name the animals, (speaking on behalf of God) indicates his role as prophet, which points to Jesus’ role as prophet, speaking on behalf of His Father, God.
- Adam’s response to God’s gift of Eve, prefigures Jesus’ passion for His bride, the Church.
- Gen 2:23 is covenant language making Adam the bridegroom of all humanity (Eve), pointing to Jesus as the Bridegroom of the Body of Christ (all of humanity).

Common Errors:

Assessments:

These studies, as part of the new Religion Curriculum, seek to accomplish two goals for the students. One is that they encounter God and grow in the virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love toward Him. These cannot be assessed through objective measures like tests. Teachers will instead observe their students for fruits that may be attributed to having been a part of this study. Teachers can ask what thoughts or feelings are inspired by the Bible passages. There are no right or wrong answers to these types of questions.

The second goal is for the students to learn the actions and words of God throughout history along with their theological meaning. Teachers can assess their learning of these elements with objective measures. You may consider one of the following assessments for your students:

1. Can students recall the types and meanings of those types from the Bible Story?
2. Can students recall the symbols and their meanings? (you may include the drawing of the illustrations from Bible Basics for Catholic.)
3. Can students recall the major individuals and events of the story?

Methodology

Typology: “the study of persons, places, events, and institutions in the Bible that foreshadow later and greater realities made known by God in history.” - Scott Hahn, Catholic Bible Dictionary, pg. 929. See also CCC 128 and pg. 38 of Understanding the Scriptures.

- First man (Adam) from the earth (Adamah) breaks his covenant with God, while the new Adam (Jesus) from heaven fulfills the covenant with God (redemption).
- Harmony of all creation in the garden of Eden, before the fall, points to the renewed harmony of all creation, as we await, that will be restored at the Parousia.
- By choosing to not suffer for love of his Father and his bride, breaks his covenant made with God, which is re-established by Jesus’ willingness to suffer out of total love for His Father and his bride, the Church.
- The Garden of Eden is just a glimpse of what awaits us in Heaven. (Rev 21-22)

Assessments:

These studies, as part of the new Religion Curriculum, seek to accomplish two goals for the students. One is that they encounter God and grow in the virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love toward Him. These cannot be assessed through objective measures like tests. Teachers will instead observe their students to see if growth is happening. Teachers can ask what thoughts or feelings are inspired by the Bible passages. There are no right or wrong answers to these.

The second goal is for the students to learn the actions and words of God throughout history along with their theological meaning. Teachers can assess their learning of these elements with objective measures. You may consider one of the following assessments for your students:

1. Can students recall the types and meanings of those types from the Bible Story?
2. Can students recall the symbols and their meanings? (You may include the drawing of the illustrations from Bible Basics for Catholic.)
3. Can students recall the major individuals and events of the story?

Instructions for Teachers:

Here you will find a collection of references for doing a Bible Study with your students. The mission is for you to lead your students through reading, pondering, and discussing these events recorded in this section of the Bible. All of the studies, from 4th through 7th grade focus on God's covenant relationship with man through particular mediators, Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and Jesus. You will find a brief explanation of the story/events, all the Biblical references to read, and a list of references and resources you can use to prepare yourself.

In the Resources section you will find a few books for your reference. These are chosen because they cover, in a very thorough yet concise way, each of these studies. You will find direct references to the relevant chapters in each of these books. You do not need to use every book. It is advisable to pick one and stick with it. The simplest one is Bible Basics for Catholics, by John Bergsma. This book includes simple stick-figure illustrations that the children could draw to help them learn the details of the studies. Bergsma intentionally included these for teachers and catechists. The most detailed one is Understanding the Scriptures by Scott Hahn, including lots of maps, charts, and artwork depicting scenes from these Bible stories.

Since most of these studies involve multiple sections of Scripture, it would be best to spread these out over the course of weeks or months. The study intentionally correlates with the **Benchmarks** covering the sacrament for your grade so that you can integrate them together. This means the Bible study can be done at any point during the year and used as a reference point for other teachings included in the framework.

You will also find in your Sophia Institute textbook examples of artwork that could correlate with your study.

Overview of the Story

This Bible study should take four weeks to complete.

This Bible study on Moses will cover a portion of the book of Exodus. Exodus recounts how the Hebrew nation becomes God's chosen people through the covenant mediated by Moses. The first half is the historical record of the struggle to free God's people from Egypt and lead them into the desert where they encounter the presence of God at the foot of Mt. Sinai.

Here they receive from God instructions for a life centered on Him.

God intervenes throughout this account on behalf of his people to bring about His plan of salvation: God reveals his name to Moses and the Israelites, identifying himself with them above all other people on earth. God establishes the form of worship, based on ritual sacrifice that will shape Israel's worship for centuries to come. God fulfills his promise of land to Abraham by leading the Israelites into what is now known as the Holy Land. And here we are introduced to the ritual (sacrifice and meal) which foreshadows the greatest gift God offers man, the Holy Eucharist.

Assessments:

These studies, as part of the new Religion Curriculum, seek to accomplish two goals for the students. One is that they encounter God and grow in the virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love toward Him. These cannot be assessed through objective measures like tests. Teachers will instead observe their students to see if growth is happening.

The second goal is for the students to learn the actions and words of God throughout history along with their theological meaning. Teachers can assess their learning of these elements with objective measures. You may consider one of the following assessments for your students:

1. Can students recall the types and meanings of those types from the Bible Story?
2. Can students recall the symbols and their meaning? (you may include the drawing of the illustrations from Bible Basics for Catholic.)
3. Can students recall the major individuals and events of the story?

Seventh Grade Bible Study: David

Instructions for Teachers:

Here you will find a collection of references for doing a Bible Study with your students. The mission is for you to lead your students through reading, pondering, and discussing these events recorded in this section of the Bible. All of the studies, from 4th through 7th grade focus on God's covenant relationship with man through particular mediators, Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and Jesus. You will find a brief explanation of the story/events, all the Biblical references to read, and a list of references and resources you can use to prepare yourself.

In the Resources section you will find a few books for your reference. These are chosen because they cover, in a very thorough yet concise way each of these studies. You will find direct references to the relevant chapters in each of these books. You do not need to use every book. It is advisable to pick one and stick with it. The simplest one is Bible Basics for Catholics, by John Bergsma. This book includes simple stick-figure illustrations that the children could draw to help them learn the details of the studies. Bergsma intentionally included these for teachers and catechists. The most detailed one is Understanding the Scriptures by Scott Hahn, including lots of maps, charts, and artwork depicting scenes from these Bible stories.

Since most of these studies involve multiple sections of Scripture, it would be best to spread these out over the course of weeks or months. The study intentionally correlates with the **Benchmarks** covering the sacrament for your grade so that you can integrate them together. This means the Bible study can be done at any point during the year and used as a reference point for other teachings included in the framework.

You will also find in your Sophia Institute textbook examples of artwork that could correlate with your study.

Overview of the Story

This is the final Covenant in the Old Testament before Jesus' coming to fulfill them all. This involves the development of the nation of Israel into a Kingdom. God establishes a King of many nations, who becomes the most beloved king of Israel and most important, being mentioned in the Old Testament over 1,000 times.

King David, who was from Bethlehem (meaning "house of bread"), was a shepherd who, as king, unified the twelve tribes of Israel, making Jerusalem its capital.

David was a model of worship for his people, introducing Music: and songs to worship and becoming the first writer of Psalms

Assessments:

These studies, as part of the new Religion Curriculum, seek to accomplish two goals for the students. One is that they encounter God and grow in the virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love toward Him. These cannot be assessed through objective measures like tests. Teachers will instead observe their students to see if growth is happening. Teachers can ask what thoughts or feelings are inspired by the Bible passages. There are no right or wrong answers to these.

The second goal is for the students to learn the actions and words of God throughout history along with their theological meaning. Teachers can assess their learning of these elements with objective measures. You may consider one of the following assessments for your students:

1. Can students recall the types and meanings of those types from the Bible Story?
2. Can students recall the symbols and their meaning? (You may include the drawing of the illustrations from Bible Basics for Catholic.)
3. Can students recall the major individuals and events of the story?

Eighth Grade Bible Study: Acts of the Apostles

Instructions for Teachers:

Here you will find a collection of references for doing a Bible Study with your students. The mission is for you to lead your students through reading, pondering, and discussing these events recorded in this section of the Bible. All of the studies, from 4th through 7th grade focus on God's covenant relationship with man through particular mediators, Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and Jesus. You will find a brief explanation of the story/events, all the Biblical references to read, and a list of references and resources you can use to prepare yourself.

In the Resources section you will find a few books for your reference. These are chosen because they cover, in a very thorough yet concise way each of these studies. You will find direct references to the relevant chapters in each of these books. You do not need to use every book. It is advisable to pick one and stick with it. The simplest one is Bible Basics for Catholics, by John Bergsma. This book includes simple stick-figure illustrations that the children could draw to help them learn the details of the studies. Bergsma intentionally included these for teachers and catechists. The most detailed one is Understanding the Scriptures by Scott Hahn, including lots of maps, charts, and artwork depicting scenes from these Bible stories.

Since most of these studies involve multiple sections of Scripture, it would be best to spread these out over the course of weeks or months. The study intentionally correlates with the **Benchmarks** covering the sacrament for your grade so that you can integrate them together. This means the Bible study can be done at any point during the year and used as a reference point for other teachings included in the framework.

You will also find in your Sophia Institute textbook examples of artwork that could correlate with your study.

Overview of the Story

This study recounts the birth and history of the early Church and how it continues Jesus' mission of salvation. You will trace the growth of the Church beginning with Pentecost, continuing with the life of the followers of Jesus; through the persecution of Christians by Saul, including the arrest and martyrdom of Stephen. Saul then experiences conversion and becomes the Apostle Paul, who embarks on three missionary journeys to start churches throughout the Middle East.

We should explain Pentecost as the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies, the fulfillment of Jesus' promise to send the Holy Spirit, and the role and power of the Holy Spirit within the early Church. The link below does a great job of explaining how the Old Testament is fulfilled at Pentecost in the New Testament. The failures and offenses made by the Israelites in the Old Testament are made up for and restored in the New Testament.

We should also note that the covenants in the Old Testament are made with God. Families are

created and made bigger each time a covenant is made with God. In the New Testament the covenant is made with Jesus who invites the entire world into His family; the end for which we are all created.

Assessments:

These studies, as part of the new Religion Curriculum, seek to accomplish two goals for the students. One is that they encounter God and grow in the virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love toward Him. These cannot be assessed through objective measures like tests. Teachers will instead observe their students for fruits that may be attributed to having been a part of this study. Teachers can ask what thoughts or feelings are inspired by the Bible passages. There are no right or wrong answers to these types of questions.

The second goal is for the students to learn the actions and words of God throughout history along with their theological meaning. Teachers can assess their learning of these elements with objective measures. You may consider one of the following assessments for your students:

1. Can students recall the types and their meaning from the Bible Story?
2. Can students recall the symbols and their meaning? (you may include the drawing of the illustrations from Bible Basics for Catholics.)
3. Can students recall the major individuals and events of the story?
